Welcome to the 1st "Let's Talk Falls Lothian" Newsletter of 2024.

WHY FOCUS ON FALLS?

- Globally, falls are a major public health problem. An estimated 684 000 fatal falls occur each year, making it the second leading cause of unintentional injury death, after road traffic injuries (WHO).
- Managing the consequences of falls is estimated to cost health and social care services in Scotland in excess of £470 million every year.
- Most falls happen in hospitals and care homes
- In 2023, there were over 16,000 A & E falls related attendances in Edinburgh alone in 2023, however that figure is down from 2022.

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FALLS PROGRAMME WORK

Falls Programme work is focussing on stands of work that include data, education and strategy. Keep up to date on Falls Programme work <u>here.</u>

Data work includes the development of a Falls dashboard which will move the current community partnership reports onto a more accessible platform.

The dashboard will provide some data, trends and patterns enabling more insight to falls across Lothian.

The Falls Education group has completed work reviewing the existing falls content on the Lothian staff intranet pages and a new accessible platform will be launched in 2024. This will include relevant Falls information for all health and social care staff. The group has also looked at Falls education training, and will be supporting the delivery of a set of Scotland wide falls modules currently being shaped and formatted for use by NHS Education for Scotland.

A new Falls Train the Trainer package has been developed by two clinical educators in the group providing Falls training material that people can utilise to deliver in their own areas to suit their specific staff needs.

'LET'S TALK FALLS' TEAMS CHANNEL

To celebrate Falls awareness week in September, we launched a Lothian wide Falls teams channel called 'Let's Talk Falls Lothian'.

Sharing falls updates from the Inpatient and Community Falls groups

Community Falls Focus

Community Falls Learning Conference

East Lothian hosted a joint Community Falls Learning and Networking event during Falls week with all 4 health and social care partnerships. This provided a great opportunity for Falls practitioners in the 4 partnerships to come together and share progress and learning around the great falls work that is carried out in each area.

Presentations from the event included updates from the local areas on their falls services, managing falls in the Midlothian community hospital, falls work in Lothian care homes, Smplicare - how digital falls equipment can potentially be used to help prevent and pre-empt falls and a real life story and case study using Equine therapy to reduce falls and and increase strength and mobility.

Inpatient Falls Focus

Scottish Patient Safety Programme (SPSP) Collaborative

The SPSP Acute Adult Collaborative, supported by Healthcare Improvement Scotland, concludes with sustained improvement in falls and falls with harm demonstrated across a number of hospitals and NHS boards.

NHS Lothian has achieved a sustained improvement in falls and the graph on the right charts some of the progress.


A highlights report with more information, sharing interventions and successes will be circulated by the SPSP team following their closing event in March.

In Progress activities from the inpatient group

Some of the activities and change ideas happening across different inpatient areas include: 7 day activity coordinators; 7day twilight shifts; change in ward routines based on falls data; breakfast clubs; planned activities at peak falls times; review of falls prevention alarms and focusing on single rooms

The Royal Edinburgh Hospital is planning a Falls focus week at the end of February 2024 with on site falls information, training and equipment demonstrations. More information around the week will be posted nearer the date in the Let's Talk Falls Teams channel <u>here</u>.
